Christlike Leaders for Every

SESSION GOALS	
The point of every session is a main idea with the goal of informing our knowing, feeling, and doing.	
MAIN IDEA: We're called to be like Jesus, the greatest leader who ever lived. Head Change: To know that Christlike	
leaders are formed into Christ's image through mentoring, spiritual disciplines,	
and life's challenges. Heart Change: To feel grateful that not only does Jesus give us a perfect	
example of leadership, He also empowers us to lead the way He did. Life Change: To lead with the acrostic	
MATURE in mind: being meek, authentic, teachable, unifying,	
relational, and empathetic.	

<u>OPEN</u>	
What three adjectives would you use to describe your nation's leader, or your boss, or one of the leaders in your church?	
We've generally got a lot to say about the leaders around us. In this session, Chadwick Mohan helps us to focus instead on what it means to become Christlike leaders, because these are the kinds of leaders we need in the church and indeed in every sector of society.	
<u>VIEW</u>	
As you watch, write down how Chadwick answers these questions.	
Is meekness a strength or a weakness?	
Why is authenticity particularly important in today's culture?	
How did Chadwick's father show that he was teachable, even as an older man who had been a Christian for decades?	
What did Jesus pray for us in John 17?	
How did Jesus show that He was relational and empathetic?	
Show SESSION #3: Christlike Leaders for Every Church and Sector (15 minutes)	

REVIEW	
Chadwick opens the session by stating that	
we lack effective leadership in the church and	
the world at large. Do you agree? Why, or	
why not?	
The greatest leadership principles known to	
humankind can be extracted from the	
exemplary life of Jesus. Name some leaders	
who have inspired you at different times in	
your life. Did any of these leaders	
demonstrate Christlike qualities? If so,	
which ones?	
Chadwick explains that Christlike leaders	
aren't just born. They are formed and matured	
into the image of Christ through life's	
challenges, spiritual disciplines and practices,	
and through mentors who shape them into	
people who resemble Christ. Who or what	
has been particularly instrumental in your	
development as a leader? If you could only	
pick one, which spiritual discipline (for	
example, Bible reading, fasting, prayer, or	
silence and solitude) would you	
recommend to a younger believer who	
wants to grow as a Christlike leader? Why?	
Chadwick suggests we use the helpful	
acrostic <i>MATURE</i> to process the qualities of a	
Christlike leader. <i>M</i> is for <i>meekness</i> —or	
humility—as modeled through Jesus' servant-	
hearted leadership (Matthew 20:25–28). Why	
do you think there are misconceptions	
about meekness being a weakness?	

Discuss the idea that being self- deprecating or self-pitying is the very opposite of humility and is actually a form of pride and self-obsession. Who stands out to you as humble—happily self- forgetful—despite being aware of their strengths and the value they add? In your capacity as a leader, who have you served this week?	
A is for authentic, accountable, and authority (Matthew 28:18–19). Why is authenticity such a countercultural leadership	
attribute? Why is it important for leaders to live in community? To whom are you accountable, as a leader? Talk about the difference between leading with authority	
T is for teachable. Is it easy to follow a leader who thinks they know everything? Describe	
a recent teachable moment you've benefited from as a leader. Why is it inspiring—even moving—to see a mature,	
elderly Christian taking notes in church or learning from someone with less experience than them?	
U is for unifier. Of all the things Jesus could've prayed for us, His church, He prayed that we	
might be unified (John 17). Why is unity in the church so important? How might a leader	
R is for relational .lesus clearly cared deeply	

about others, offering them His time and	
undivided attention, and being approachable	
and interruptible. Why do you think some	
leaders separate themselves relationally	
from those they're leading? What would it	
look like for you to love the people you're	
leading this week?	
E is for empathetic. Effective leaders know and	
understand their people. How did Jesus	
demonstrate that He even loved those who	
killed Him? How do the people you're	
leading know you care about them?	
BIBLE EXPLORATION	
Numbers 12:3 reads, "Now Moses was very	
humble—more humble than any other person	
on earth.' How did Moses prove that a	
humble leader is also brave and selfless?	
Read Proverbs 9:9 and Proverbs 13:18. Who is	
the most teachable leader you know? What	
could you do to be more like them? Talk	
about a time when you were glad you asked	
a question (because if you hadn't sought	
clarity, further teaching, or an explanation,	
you would've led your family or	
organization to disaster).	
Read Luke 12:48 and Romans 14:12. As a	
leader, do you feel as if you've been	
entrusted with little or much? Why?	
John tells us, "Jesus knew that the Father had	

given Him authority over everything and that He had come from God and would return to	
God." (John 13:3) What did Jesus do	
immediately after this revelation? What might it look like for you to lead with both	
authority and humility?	
Read Acts 4:13. What led onlookers to the	
realization that Peter and John had	
undeniable authority as leaders?	
Paul writes, "Above all, clothe yourselves with	
love, which binds us all together in perfect harmony." (Colossians 3:14) Do you think the	
people under your leadership would	
describe you as always "clothed with love"?	
What would change in your church, family, organization, or workplace if unity was	
achieved, overnight?	
LAST WORD	
To be impactful leaders in the church and in the wider world, let's follow Jesus, the	
greatest leader of all. May we look to His exemplary life in all we do, trusting Him to	
mature us and to use us for His glory and the	
furthering of His Kingdom.	

DEEPER WALK

Select at least one activity below to complete before watching the next session.

Read: Read John 13:34–35 and Matthew 9:36. What kind of courage will be required of you, if you're to be known as a Christlike leader in the world out there?

Write: Look at the acrostic MATURE again. Write down the leadership attribute you feel God is challenging you to focus on in this season, then write down any ideas that come to mind. For example, if the attribute is teachable, you may have the idea, Buy coffee for ______ (a leader you look up to) and ask them about _____ (an area of life in which you want to grow).

Pray: Romans 12:9–13 says, "Love must be sincere. Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. Be devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above yourselves. Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality." Turn these verses into a prayer for yourself as a leader, and for those leading you.
